


We Need Your Help!

Attendance Reminder

It is the belief of the Big Sandy School District that students who attend school regularly learn more and are more successful. Doing the assignment for the day, can never completely make-up for the learning that is missed during an absence from school. As a parent, you can help Big Sandy and your student by assuring their regular attendance each day. If it is necessary for your child to be absent, please contact the office at 541-2291. Absences that are not reported are automatically considered unexcused and can carry both attendance and academic consequences. As we begin a new semester, review the teacher expectations with your child and revisit your student handbook for clarification of the attendance policy. Here are three ideas to help your son/daughter make the most of his/her educational experience:

- 1.Limit late-night work hours to the weekend.
- 2.Make sure your student has a loud alarm clock.
- 3.Stress why he/she needs to get to school on time. An employer will not let him/her show up whenever he/she feels like it.

Students are allowed 8 excused absences (only 2 unexcused absences) per semester, and many students have exceeded that number from the first semester. 16 excused absences are allowed for the entire school year. When your student goes over the 8 absences for the semester or 16 absences for the year a Monday school or multiple Monday schools may be a consequence that is enforced. After 16 absences in the school year, the student and parents may be required to appear before the Big Sandy Board of Education. If your child has more than 16 absences (excused and/or unexcused) you may be invited to the April board meeting. The School Board reserves the right to allow academic sanctions, loss of credit, or other suitable measures for violations of the district's attendance policy.

We encourage students to be in school, but with all the craziness again this year we also encourage students to stay home when they are not feeling well. Parents you have done an outstanding job this year keeping your kids home when they have been sick or having any sickness symptoms, and we appreciate that! I believe that is one of the reasons that we have been able to stay in school with in person learning again this year. Please contact your child's teachers for missing work, how to make-up participation points and any questions that may arise from your child's absence.

Annual Audit

Our annual audit showed that our overall fund balances are very healthy. Thank you to Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Hankins for all of their extra work in keeping our record keeping straight, especially, with the many COVID related grants. We are waiting to hear from the Colorado Department of Education about our four year audit.

Preliminary Budget

The Governor has made revisions to his Preliminary Budget that was introduced in November. He proposes to cut the Budget Stability Factor by \$120 million; he hopes to eliminate it during his next four years in office; public schools have had \$10 billion taken away in the past 22 years. The legislative session will take the current Governor's Budget as a starting point and then will be working on it throughout the legislative session, which started in January and runs until May.

Universal Preschool Program

Colorado's Universal Preschool Program (UPK) has its portal open for enrollment. The state has been very aggressive getting this program rolled out in a short amount of time. With it comes a lot of issues not working quite right and things being worked trying to be fixed as they are pushing fast to have it running for the 2023-2024 school year.

Final Budget

Last month we approved the school's final budget for this current 2022-2023 school year. We also passed the current mill levy which is slightly higher than last year due to assessed valuations going down. After amending our bond agreement a year ago and being able to cut the interest rate in half, we will have a lower payment to be made for the final nine years of this "mortgage." (Hard to believe we have already paid off 11 years towards our "new" school building...this is our 10th year being in it.)

Pikes Peak Superintendents' Meeting

This month we will be hosting the Pikes Peak Superintendents' Meeting at Big Sandy Schools; this will be the first time a rural school has hosted it in 18 years.

Raymond Hope Foundation

Finally, we are very appreciative to Raymond Hope and his wife in establishing the Raymond Hope Foundation and its gift to the Big Sandy School District. With this gift of money, we are using it to give scholarships for students, for athletic/playground expenses and to help those having needs.

SENIORS:

If you haven't already done so, it's time to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)! Seniors and their parents (just 1 of them) need to register for a FSA ID. This username and password is required to electronically sign the FAFSA. Visit www.studentaid.gov/fsaid to learn about and create a FSA ID.

Go to <u>www.fafsa.gov</u> to complete your FAFSA. Your actual 2021 income tax information is used to report your financial information. This process is completely free! You are in the wrong place if anything appears about a cost to complete the FAFSA.

After your FAFSA has been submitted expect a Student Aid Report (SAR) to be sent via email or posted to your student's portal (college account). The most important item on this report is your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). This number is used by colleges to determine what to offer you as Financial Aid. Carefully review your SAR to make sure that the information processed is correct. There is a process to make changes if needed. Again, the website to access the FAFSA is www.fafsa.gov.

After submitting the FAFSA, the next step will be to review your Financial Aid Award document from the colleges where you have applied to and have been accepted. If you have not yet applied to college then the FAFSA information will not be processed to generate an award from that college! Award letters will be sent out soon (probably on the college's student portal system) and when reviewing this information pay close attention to the COA (Cost of Attendance) and then the various awards including any: grants, scholarships, work study, Perkins Loans, Direct Stafford Loans, and Direct Plus Loans (parent loans). When considering Stafford Loans remember that as subsidized loan means that the government pays the interest that accrues on that loan while you are in college. An unsubsidized loan means that you will be responsible for paying back the interest that accrues on the loan during the time that you were a college student. Stafford loan repayment begins 6 months after you are no longer a full time college student. I am glad to look at award letters with you to help you understand what is being offered.

Students are continuing to work on scholarship applications during Senior Seminar. Our students are provided information on hundreds of scholarship opportunities. The only sure way to not receive a scholarship is to not apply! We have set aside every Friday through April 15th as a work day for college scholarships, etc.

Make sure that all of your pictures have been submitted to the school for the senior video and the yearbook! Caps and gowns need to be ordered ASAP if you have not done so! You may order online at www.herffjones.com. You want to look for the Southern Colorado office. There is no option to choose color – that is decided by the seniors and approved by the school administration. The caps and gowns will be mailed directly to the school in time for graduation and following the ceremony, the caps and gowns are yours to keep.

SENIORS CONTINUED:

Reminder – all 18-year old men must register for selective service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. You can register at www.sss.gov.

Don't forget that each senior is given the opportunity for college visits. Seniors may miss 2 days of school for these activities without affecting their attendance for the year. Mr. Thieman has forms to be completed if a student is going on a job shadow or a college visit.

Parents – please feel free to call my office any time that I can assist you in the college admission and financial aid processes. A great deal of information about both topics is available online; just remember that it should always be free!

JUNIORS:

All enrolled juniors will be taking the Colorado SAT on Wednesday, April 12th. SAT scores are used by some colleges for admissions decisions and by numerous merit-based scholarship organizations. All juniors have a chance to complete the writing portion (essay) of the assessment. It is not necessary to complete the writing portion, but it is a free option. The SAT with Essay will take approximately 1 hour longer than the SAT. If your junior would like to take the SAT with Essay, they have until February 15th to update their registration. This process may be completed either online at "My SAT" after signing in to their College Board accounts at www.sat.org or by calling 1-866-917-9030 and selecting option 2. I will be assisting any of our interested juniors through this process. If the student does not add the essay option to their registration, then they will take the regular SAT without essay.

The ACT is still offered at a variety of test sites around the area on Saturdays. The next ACT test date is April 15th with a regular registration deadline of March 10th. Go to www.act.org for more information.

FRESHMEN & SOPHOMORES:

All enrolled freshmen and sophomores will be taking the Colorado PSAT 9 and 10 on April 12th. The PSAT results will be used by the State for school accountability purposes and to prepare students for success on the SAT.







Advancing Colorado's health and protecting the places we live, learn, work and play

Dear parents/guardians of students attending Colorado kindergarten - 12th grade schools for the 2023-24 school

We know you're thinking of all the things you need to do to make sure your student is ready for school. Getting vaccinated is an important part of their school readiness and keeps children from catching and spreading diseases that can make them sick and potentially disrupt in-person learning.

Required and recommended vaccines:

- Colorado law requires students who attend a public, private, or parochial Kindergarten 12th grade school to be vaccinated against many of the diseases vaccines can prevent unless a Certificate of Exemption is filed. For more information, visit cdphe.colorado.gov/schoolrequiredvaccines. Your student must be vaccinated against:
 - o Diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (DTaP, Tdap).
 - Hepatitis B (HepB). 0
 - 0 Measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR).
 - 0 Polio (IPV).
 - Varicella (chickenpox).
- Colorado follows recommendations set by Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices. Prior to starting Kindergarten, students must receive their final doses of DTaP, IPV, MMR, and varicella. Prior to starting sixth grade, students must receive one dose of Tdap vaccine, even if the student is younger than 11 years. You can view recommended vaccine schedules at: www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/easy-to-read/child-easyread.html (birth through 6 years) or www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/easy-to-read/adolescent-easyread.html (7 to 18 years):
- CDC also recommends vaccines for COVID-19, hepatitis A (HepA), human papillomavirus (HPV), influenza (flu), and meningococcal disease (MenACWY and MenB), but these are not required for school entry in Colorado.

Exclusion from school

- Your student may be excluded from school if your school does not have an up-to-date Certificate of Immunization, Certificate of Exemption, or an in-process plan on file for your student.
- If someone gets sick with a vaccine-preventable disease or there is an outbreak at your student's school and your student has not received the vaccine for that disease, they may be excluded from school activities. That could mean lost learning time for them and lost work and wages for you. For example, if your student has not received a MMR vaccine, they may be excluded from school for 21 days after someone gets sick with measles.

Talk with a health care provider or your local public health agency (LPHA) about which vaccines your student needs or if you have questions. You can find a vaccine provider at cdphe.colorado.gov/immunizations/get-vaccinated. You can read about the safety and importance of vaccines at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/parents/FAQs.html, childvaccineco.org, ImmunizeForGood.com, and cdphe.colorado.gov/immunization-education. Staying up to date on routine immunizations is important for adults, as well as children. We encourage parents and guardians to find out what vaccines might be due. It's never too late for families to get back on track! Learn more about vaccines for adults at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/adults/rec-vac/index.html.

Paying for vaccinations

If you need help finding free or low-cost vaccines and providers who give them, go to COVax4Kids.org, contact your local public health agency (find LPHA contact information at cdphe.colorado.gov/find-your-local-public-health-agency), or call the Mile High Family Health Line at 303-692-2229 or 1-800-688-7777 to ask about Medicaid contact information and health clinics located in your area.

Vaccination records

- Share your student's updated Certificate of Immunization with their school every time they receive a vaccine.
- Need to find your student's vaccine record? It may be available from the Colorado Immunization Information System (CIIS). Visit COVaxRecords.org for more information, including directions for how to use the CIIS Public

Portal to view and print your student's vaccine record.

Exemptions

- If your student cannot get vaccines because of medical reasons, you must submit a Certificate of Medical
 Exemption to your school, signed by a physician (MD, DO), advanced practice nurse (APN), or delegated
 physician assistant (PA). You only need to submit this certificate once, unless your student's school or
 information changes. You can get the form at cdphe.colorado.gov/vaccine-exemptions.
- If you choose not to have your student vaccinated according to Colorado's school vaccine requirements for reasons that are nonmedical, you must submit a Certificate of Nonmedical Exemption to your school. Nonmedical exemptions must be submitted annually at every new school year (July 1 through June 30). There are two ways to file a nonmedical exemption.
 - File the Certificate of Nonmedical Exemption WITH the signature from an immunizing provider in Colorado who is a physician (MD, DO), advanced practice nurse (APN), delegated physician's assistant (PA), registered nurse (RN), or pharmacist licensed in Colorado; OR
 - File the Certificate of Nonmedical Exemption, which you will be able to access upon completion of the state's online immunization education module.
- Downloadable certificates and a link to the online education module are available at cdphe.colorado.gov/vaccine-exemptions.

How's your school doing on vaccinations?

Some parents/ guardians/caregivers, especially those with students who have weakened immune systems, may want to know which schools have the highest immunization rates. Annually, schools must report immunization and exemption numbers (but not student names or birth dates) to the state health department. Schools do not control their specific immunization and exemption rates or establish the Vaccinated Children Standard described in §25-4-911, CRS. Schools must include their MMR immunization and exemption rates from the most recently completed school year in this letter. Schools may choose to also include immunization and exemption rates for other school-required vaccines. Additional immunization and exemption rates can be found at COVaxRates.org.




