

OCTOBER IS FIRE PREVENTION MONTH

Each October, our Simla Fire department educates our students on fire safety. You can do your part too by making sure that your family has an evacuation plan as well as a meeting place for your family in the event of a fire. Also, don't forget to regularly change those fire alarm batteries!

CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING

Excessive technology use (video games, cell phones, computers/tablets etc.) can have several negative effects on children, including:

1. Physical Health Issues

Sedentary Lifestyle: Prolonged screen time can lead to obesity and related health problems due to lack of physical activity. Eye Strain: Extended screen use can cause digital eye strain, leading to discomfort, blurred vision, and headaches. Poor Posture: Long hours of screen time can result in back and neck problems due to improper posture.

2. Mental Health Concerns

Increased Anxiety and Depression: Overuse of technology, especially social media, can contribute to feelings of isolation and low self-esteem.

Sleep Disruption: Screen time before bed can interfere with sleep quality, leading to sleep deprivation and its associated issues.

3. Social Skills Development

Reduced Face-to-Face Interaction: Excessive screen time can hinder the development of social skills, as kids may miss out on important in-person interactions.

Difficulty in Communication: Reliance on texting and online interactions can impair the ability to engage in meaningful conversations.

4. Cognitive Effects

Decreased Attention Span: Rapid content consumption on screens can lead to shorter attention spans and difficulties focusing on tasks. Impaired Learning: Overreliance on screens for entertainment may reduce time spent on educational activities and critical thinking.

5. Behavioral Issues

Increased Aggression: Exposure to violent content can lead to desensitization and increased aggressive behaviors in some children. Addictive Behaviors: Children may develop dependency on screens for entertainment, leading to withdrawal symptoms when they are not using them.

6. Disruption of Family Dynamics

Less Family Interaction: Excessive screen time can reduce quality family time and communication, impacting relationships. Neglect of Responsibilities: Children may neglect chores, homework, and other responsibilities in favor of screen activities.

STRATEGIES FOR MITIGATION

To counteract these effects, parents can:

Set Limits: Establish clear rules about screen time and enforce breaks. Encourage Outdoor Activities: Promote physical play and outdoor experiences.

Model Healthy Behavior: Demonstrate balanced technology use in your own habits.

Engage in Co-Viewing: Watch or play together to foster discussions about content and its impact.

By being mindful of technology use, parents can help mitigate these negative effects and encourage healthier habits for their children.

Happy Fall everyone! The Counseling Office operates with an opendoor policy. If I, or Mrs. Shannon Hoops - School Counselor Corps Grant Manager and Student Advocate, can assist any student or parent, our doors are open to you – stop in!

Parents - please call in advance (719.541.2291) so that we can be sure to be available. You may also email questions to me at: waiving their application fees during this time. cthieman@bigsandy100j.org or to Mrs. Hoops at: shannonh@bigsandy100j.org.

We want to continue to identify and monitor students who are struggling with the passing of one of our 2024 graduates, Dalton Hisle. As you talk with your children about these things and feel that extra support might be needed, please let us know. We are glad to provide a safe and confidential place for your students to talk with a school counselor. We also now have professional counseling services available in Simla and can provide referral information in either Colorado Springs or Limon for mental health therapists.

SENIORS:

Our seniors are currently researching degree programs and college/vocational & technical school/apprenticeship options. We have been making use of online resources including a statesponsored website known as My Colorado Journey. This site provides guidance in career planning, college planning, and financial aid. Currently the seniors are working through the College Application Month materials in preparation for the FREE college/university application day which will actually be over 3 days: October 15th-17th. Colorado universities and colleges are



Seniors need to have their required job shadow completed by Oct. 11th (the end of the 1st quarter). The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) will open December 1st. The following article (https://thecollegeinvestor.com/47454/2025-2026-fafsa-form-things-to-know) provides helpful information in preparation for that opening. One thing that can be done now is to set up a FSA ID. This will be used as a login and an approval signature on the digital application. Parents need a separate FSA ID from their senior but if you already have one that you have used with your other children, then you do not need a different one. Go to www.studentaid.gov to complete the process.

Seniors need to remember to sign up in the scholarship book to receive the applications that arrive in my office. We continually update our scholarship list and are always looking for new information to add. If you find out about a scholarship opportunity that is not included on our list, please let me know. We also have a link to our scholarship spreadsheet on the school

website: www.bigandy100j.com. Another useful online resource to search for scholarships is found at www.fastweb.com.

There are some scholarship applications that are open right now and seniors should be working

on those applications. It is important to not wait until the last minute to complete applications! I regularly remind our seniors that they will not have enough time during senior seminar class to complete all of their applications – they must use additional time away from school to accomplish all that needs to be done! Our seniors will be attending a college fair in Limon on Wednesday, October 9th.

Senior seminar participation policy: Virtually all of the content of the senior seminar course is given in class through direct student/teacher contact. Because it is so important to be in class for this instruction, we have a clear participation policy. If a student is present and participating, they receive 5 daily points. If a student is not present or is not participating, they do not receive the points for that day. The only non-participation excuses accepted are: 1. college visits/job shadows; 2. other school related events such as early dismissal for athletics; and 3. a doctor's written release from attendance/participation. If a student does not earn their participation points for the day, they will have the opportunity to complete an extra credit assignment at the end of the quarter to earn additional points. This policy is necessary to help ensure that our seniors are present and participating in class on a regular basis.

JUNIORS & SOPHOMORES:

We will be giving the digital PSAT/NMSQT assessment on Wednesday, Oct. 16th. This optional test for 10th & 11th graders is a practice for the SAT and is the qualifier for juniors to be in the

National Merit Scholarship program. Entry into the scholar-







ship competition is determined solely by the PSAT/NMSQT score. See Mr. Thieman for more details and to sign up for the test if you

would like to take it. The next ACT test date is Saturday, October 26th. The regular registration deadline has passed but it is possible to submit a late registration. The next test date for which the regular registration is open is December 14th and the regular registration deadline is through November 8th. The cost is \$69. Go to www.act.org to register for the ACT. All enrolled juniors will take the SAT for free here at the school during the month of April.

ALL HS GRADES:

To meet the Higher Education Admissions Requirements (HEAR) for Colorado's public colleges and universities, graduating students should have completed: 4 years of English; 4 years of Math

(Alg. 1 and higher); 3 years each of Science and Social Studies; 1 year of Foreign Language (Simla offers Spanish); and 2 additional years of academic

(Simia offers Spanish); and 2 additional years of academi electives. (**Foreign Language is not

required for graduation at Simla and only 3 years of high school math are required.) Keep these college admission requirements in mind when choosing the types of courses to take each year. FYI – students who take Algebra I during their 8th grade year are still required to complete 3 more high school level math classes between their 9th and 12th grade years. Our expectation is that each high school student has successfully completed Algebra 1, Geometry, and Algebra 2 as a regular course of mathematics study.

ATTENDANCE: THE KEY TO YOUR STUDENTS SUCCESS

In an edition of The Parent Institute, the following clip was published. It stresses the importance of regular attendance at school. Research shows that children who are in school most of the time do better on state tests.

Here's how you can improve your child's school attendance –

- Talk with your child about the importance of attending school regularly.
 Avoid scheduling family trips or doctor appointments during school hours.
 Make sure your child stays healthy by eating nutritious food and getting enough sleep and exercise.
- 4. Don't accept excuses for why your child "must" miss or be late to school. From the Principal's Desk
- 5. Discuss with your child what happened at school each day.
- 6. Support school rules and consequences for skipping class and being tardy.
- 7. Show your child why education is important and give specific examples of how education helps people succeed.

Thus far, we have done a wonderful job of being present and ready to learn. Our secondary school reported a 94% attendance rate this past year. This year we want to try to do even better. Thank you, our students and parents, for the commitment to Big Sandy Schools and our drive for excellence. With all that being said, we do want your child to stay home if they are sick. As much as we want students in school, we want them in school healthy even more. Please call the office if your child isn't feeling well, and if you do go to the doctor, please bring a doctor's note back to the office when your child returns to school. Let's all work together to stay healthy and stay in person this year!

1/2 DAY POLICY

Secondary students participating in extra-curricular activities (sports and clubs) must be in attendance a ½ day in order to practice or play in an event for that same day. The definition of a ½ day is 4 hours of attendance in a school day. If a bus

is leaving after 12:00 p.m. the student must be in attendance

for 4 hours of that school day. If the bus is leaving earlier that 12:00 p.m. the student must be in

attendance for all hours in that school day.

EXPECTATIONS OF STUDENTS AT GAMES

If your child attends a ball game, please make sure that he/she is supervised and watches the game.

If staff needs to correct a student, then the student will receive consequences such as a lunch or after

school detention and the student will need to sit with the parent or with the adult who brought him/her to the game. Students who are notplaying in the athletic event that night, should not be in any of the locker rooms for ANY reason. If students are in the locker rooms, they will be asked to sit with their parents. Also, students and adults should not use the north doors off of the locker rooms to enter the gyms. Please come in the main doors through the gate. If inappropriate behavior continues then the student will need to stay home and not attend extracurricular activities until the administration decides that he or she is ready to follow the rules. Thank you for your cooperation. We





have these rules so the patrons can watch the games and to try and ensure student safety.

EXPECTATIONS OF PARENTS AND FANS AT GAMES

Our expectation for all parents and fans at games is to have appropriate behavior at all times. The use of inappropriate language, heckling of the after the first semester of opposing teams' players and coaches, heckling of our own players and coaches, and inappropriate behavior and language towards an official are inexcusable. If behavior from any of our parents or fans is inappropriate in any way you may be asked to leave the game by a school administrator. School administration will then determine if you will be allowed to attend future extracurricular events. Our goal is not to remove parents or fans from games, but instead hold our parents and fans to the same high sportsmanship standards that we hold our students too.

HONOR ROLL DRAWING



We are close to finishing up our first 9-weeks of school. We have had a great start with student learning and extra-curricular activities. Overall at our school, we have had some big ups and big downs these first few weeks.



Our school district received the Colorado Department of Education Rating of Accredited with Distinction. Out of 178 school districts in Colorado which are ranked within 5 categories, there are 16 districts that ranked within their highest category. Big Sandy School District was ranked the 6th highest school district academically in Colorado! Congratulations students, parents and staff!

With continued consistent quality teaching and learning each day and week throughout the year, we expect a good year of education.

ELECTRIC BUS INFRASTRUCTURE

The infrastructure for the electric buses has been finished and the three buses have been on our routes daily; thank you to Mountain View Electric/Tri-State Energy for their recent donation along with the EPA's and CDPHE's big contributions; our school district did not pay anything for these buses and infrastructure.

BUILDING UPDATES

This past month you may have noticed that the preschool playground received a new rubber surface, the football concession stand had a new roof and awning installed (thank you Jerry Dole), we had a lot of stucco work done on the north side of the school building repairing hail damaged walls, we have some concrete and drywall work still to be done.

AUDIT

We are finishing up our annual audit and we have a sizable General Fund Balance carry over. We are still waiting to receive monies from the Elementary Science Grant, Junior High Science Grant, CDPHE's contribution for buses, ESSER II and ESSER III Rapid Request grants.

SAFETY

There are 3 "drop and go" pick up and drop off areas; the high school "drop and go" is underutilized and if used, it might give some relief to the other 2 areas.

SCHOOL CLOSURES





As a friendly reminder the state of Colorado requires that all students be current with all required vaccinations OR have a current immunization exemption on file at the school. If you have not yet done so, please provide an up-to-date immunization record or current exemption to the school as soon as possible. I will start reviewing immunization needs and sending out letters in the coming weeks to those who do not have an up-to-date immunization record or current exemptions on file. My goal is to have all of this information collected prior toThanksgiving break. Please provide a current immunization record or exemption to the school prior to leaving for Thanksgiving break.

Immunizations:

Required and recommended vaccines

- Colorado law requires students who attend a public, private, or parochial kindergarten 12th grade school to be vaccinated against many of the diseases vaccines can prevent, unless an exemption is filed. For more information, visit colorado. gov/cdphe/schoolrequiredvaccines (or cdphe.colorado.gov/schoolrequiredvaccines). Your student must be vaccinated against:
- o diphtheria, tetanus & pertussis (DTaP, DTP,Tdap) o polio (IPV)
- o measles, mumps, rubella (MMR)
- o hepatitis B (HepB)
- o varicella (chickenpox)
- Colorado follows recommendations set by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices. Students entering kindergarten must receive their final doses of DTaP, IPV, MMR and varicella. Students entering 6th grade must receive one dose of Tdap vaccine, even if they are under 11 years of age. You can view recommended vaccine schedules for children 0-6 years of age at cdc. gov/vaccines/parents/downloads/parent-versch-0-6yrs.pdf and preteens/teens 7 18 years of age at cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/downloads/teen/parent-version-schedule-7-18yrs.pdf.
- Vaccines are recommended for hepatitis A, influenza, meningococcal disease and human papillomavirus, but are not required.

Exclusion from school:

- Your student may be excluded from school if your school does not have an up-to-date vaccine record, exemption, or in-process plan for your student on file.
- If someone gets sick with a vaccine-preventable disease or there is an outbreak at your student's school and your student has not received the vaccine for that disease, they may be excluded from school activities. That could mean lost learning time for them and lost work and wages for you. For example, if your student has not received a measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine, they may be excluded from school for 21 days after someone gets sick with measles. Immunization Exemption Process:

From 2024-2025 CDPHE parent letter:

 If your student cannot get vaccines because of medical reasons, you must submit a Certificate of Medical Exemption to your school, signed by a health care provider licensed to give vaccines. You only need to submit this certificate once, unless your student's information or

school changes. You can get the form at cdphe.colorado. gov/vaccine-exemptions.

• If you choose not to have your student vaccinated according to the current recommended schedule because of personal belief or religious reasons, you must submit a Certificate of Nonmedical

Exemption to your school.

Non-medical exemptions
must be submitted annually
at the beginning of every new
school

year (current July 1 through June 30

th of the following year).

There are two ways to file a nonmedical exemption.

- x File the Certificate of Nonmedical Exemption WITH a signature from an immunizing provider, OR
- x File the Certificate of Nonmedical Exemption received upon the completion of our online education module.
- *** IF you do not have the exemption certificate signed by your child's primary care provider you MUST take the ONLINE


