READ ACROSS AMERICA

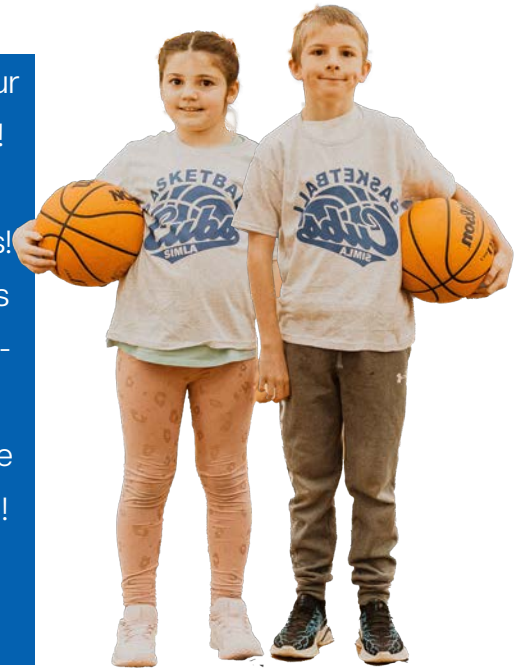

ALL STUDENTS:

My counseling office and Mrs. Hoops' counseling office is available any time for students to talk about any issue. Student/counselor conversations are kept confidential unless something is shared that may involve harm to the student or to another person. Encourage your student to stop by our counseling offices if they would like to talk! Mrs. Hoops is working with

our 2nd and 4th graders teaching a "Zones of Regulation" curriculum to help students identify how they are feeling at any given time. She is also teaching the Botvin Life Skills curriculum to our 6th graders along with their classroom teacher, Mrs. Tipton.

JUNIORS:

All enrolled juniors will be taking the Colorado SAT digitally on Wednesday, April 16th. SAT scores are used by some colleges for admissions decisions and by numerous merit-based scholarship organizations. All juniors have a chance to complete the writing portion (essay) of the assessment. It is not necessary to complete the writing portion but it is a free option. The SAT with Essay will take approximately 1 hour longer than the SAT. If your junior would like to take the SAT with Essay, they have until mid-February to work with me on updating their registration. More information about this process will be given to each junior before the deadline. If the student does not add the essay option to their registration, then they will take the regular SAT without essay (which is my recommendation). The ACT is still offered at a variety of test sites around the area on Saturdays. The next ACT test date is April 5th with a regular registration deadline of February 28th. The ACT currently costs \$65 per attempt. Go to act.org for more information and to register.

FRESHMEN & SOPHOMORES:

All enrolled freshmen and sophomores will be taking the Colorado PSAT 9 & 10 digitally on April 16th. The PSAT results will be used by the State for school accountability purposes and to prepare students for success on the SAT.



SENIORS:

If you haven't already done so, it's time to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)! Seniors and their parents need to register for a FSA ID. This username and password is required to electronically sign the FAFSA. Google "create FSA ID" to learn more about and to create a unique FSA ID. Once you have your FSA ID, go to fafsa.gov to complete your FAFSA. Your actual 2023 income tax information is used to report your financial information and it is pulled automatically from the IRS in the application process. This process is completely free! You are in the wrong place if anything appears about a cost to complete the FAFSA. After your FAFSA has been submitted and processed: "you'll receive an email with instructions on how to access an online copy of your FAFSA Submission Summary—an electronic or paper document that summarizes

the information you reported on your FAFSA form. It includes your estimated eligibility for a Federal Pell Grant and federal student loans, your Student Aid Index (SAI), and whether you've been selected for verification. The FAFSA Submission Summary replaces the Student Aid Report for the 2024-25—and following - award year(s)." (accessed: Studentaid.gov; 1/24/2024) The colleges/universities that you listed in your FAFSA application will receive your SAI and will issue you a Financial Aid award offer. That will be posted in your Financial Aid portal for each institution. Check in regularly to see if your award is posted and the next steps in order for you to accept the award offered. When reviewing this information pay close attention to the COA (Cost of Attendance) and then the various awards including any: grants, scholarships, work study, Perkins Loans, Direct Stafford Loans, and Direct Plus Loans (parent loans). When considering Stafford Loans remember that a subsidized loan means that the government pays the interest that accrues on that loan while you are in college. An unsubsidized loan means that you

will be responsible for paying back the interest that accrues on the loan during the time that you were a college student. Stafford loan repayment begins 6 months after you are no longer a full time college student (enrolled in 12 credits). YOU ARE NOT REQUIRED TO ACCEPT LOANS THAT ARE OFFERED. I am glad to look at award letters with you as needed. Students are starting to work in earnest on scholarship applications during Personal/Workforce Readiness (Senior Seminar). Our students are provided information on hundreds of scholarship opportunities. The only sure way to not receive a scholarship is to not apply! We have set aside every Friday through April 15th as a work day for college scholarships, etc. Check in with your seniors to see if they are using that time to work on scholarship applications. Representatives from Farmers State Bank are again working with our seniors once a week for 9 weeks teaching a variety of financial literacy topics. We appreciate the time and effort given by FSB on behalf of our seniors!

IMPORTANT!

Make sure that all of your pictures have been submitted to the school for the senior graduation video and the yearbook! Caps & gowns need to be ordered ASAP if you have not done so! Specific seniors have been advised if they have not yet ordered their graduation caps and gowns. You may order online at high-school.herffjones.com. You are only required to order the cap, gown, & tassel basic pack listed at \$55 currently. Any other items are optional.

There is no option to choose color – that is decided by the senior class and approved by the school administration. The caps and gowns will be mailed directly to the school in time for graduation and, following the ceremony, the caps and gowns are yours to keep. Reminder – all 18-year old men must register for selective service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. You can register at sss.gov. Don't forget that each senior is given the opportunity for college visits. Seniors may miss 2 days of school for these activities without affecting their attendance for the year. Mr. Thieman has forms to be completed if a student is going on a job shadow or a college visit. I highly recommend that you step foot on campus if you are seriously considering being a student there! Parents – please feel free to call my office (719-541-2291) any time that I can assist you in the college admission and financial aid processes. A great deal of information about both topics is available online; just remember that it should always be free!

ATTENDANCE REMINDER

It is the belief of the Big Sandy School District that students who attend school regularly learn more and are more successful. Doing the assignment for the day, can never completely make-up for the learning that is missed during an absence from school. As a parent, you can help Big Sandy and your student by assuring their regular attendance each day. If it is necessary for your child to be absent, please contact the office at 541-2291. Absences that are not reported are automatically considered unexcused and can carry both attendance and academic consequences. As we begin a new semester, review the teacher expectations with your child and revisit your student handbook for clarification of the attendance policy.

Here are three ideas to help your son/daughter make the most of his/her educational experience:

1. Limit late-night work hours to the weekend;
2. Make sure your student has a loud alarm clock; and
3. Stress why he/she needs to get to school on time.

An employer will not let him/her show up whenever he/she feels like it. Students are allowed 8 excused absences (only 2 unexcused absences) per semester, and many students have exceeded that number from the first semester. 16 excused absences are allowed for the entire school year. When your student goes over the 8 absences for the semester or 16 absences for the year a Monday school or multiple Monday schools may be a consequence that is enforced. After 16 absences in the school year, the student and parents may be required to appear before the Big Sandy Board of Education. If your child has more than 16 absences (excused and/or unexcused) you may be invited to the April board meeting. The School Board reserves the right to allow academic sanctions, loss of credit, or other suitable measures for violations of the district's attendance policy.

We encourage students to be in school, but with all the craziness again this year we also encourage students to stay home this year when they are not feeling well.

PARENTS...

you have done an outstanding job this year keeping your kids home when they have been sick or having any sickness symptoms, and we appreciate that! I believe that is one of the reasons that we have been able to stay in school with in person learning

again this year. Please contact your child's teachers for missing work, how to make participation points and any questions that may arise from your child's absence.

**WELCOME BACK TO SCHOOL, 2025**

January was Colorado School Board Recognition Month; thank you board members for your work for all of us. Chad Maranville, Greg Mitchell, Judy Book, Hank Smith and Curtis Stanko. Thank you board members for volunteering for an important, time consuming job that highly benefits our community! Overall, we had a good first semester with student learning and extracurricular activities.

BUDGET

The Governor has made revisions to his Preliminary Budget that was introduced in November. He proposes to cut the enrollment averaging component in school finance which will take money away from schools in order to help balance the state budget. The legislative session will take the current Governor’s Budget as a starting point and then will be working on it throughout the legislative session, which started in January and runs until May.

Last month we approved the school’s final budget for this current 2024-2025 school year. We also passed the current mill levy which is lower than last year. After amending our bond agreement three years ago and being able to cut the interest rate in half, we continue to have lower payments for the final seven years of our “mortgage.” (Hard to believe we have already paid off 13 years towards our “new” school building...this is our 12 th year being in it)





Advancing Colorado's health and protecting the places we live, learn, work and play

Dear families of students attending Colorado kindergarten through 12th grade schools for the 2025-26 school year: This letter includes important information about Colorado's school vaccine requirements, as well as other resources. There's nothing more important than making sure your child or children stay healthy and learning all year long. Getting vaccinated gives children and adolescents the best chance of staying healthy and in school.

Colorado law requires students who attend school to be vaccinated against many of the diseases vaccines can protect against, unless a Certificate of Exemption is filed. For more information, visit <https://cdphe.colorado.gov/immunization-policy-and-board-health-rules>. Before a student's first day of school, families are responsible for providing an up-to-date immunization record, an in-process plan, or a Certificate of Exemption to each school the student attends. An in-process plan is written by your student's immunizing provider and shows that your student is following the ACIP schedule to catch up on missing dose(s) of one or more school-required vaccines.

Getting vaccinated and following the recommended schedule is important. Think of vaccines as a special training program for the body, teaching it how to fight off harmful germs. The protection from vaccines can last a very long time, which helps to keep your child, your family, and your community safe and healthy.

Vaccines required for school

To attend school, your student must be vaccinated against:

- Hepatitis B (HepB)
- Diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (DTaP, Tdap)
- Measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR)
- Polio (IPV)
- Varicella (chickenpox)

Get kindergarten ready: Colorado law requires children between the ages of 4 and 6 years to receive their final doses of DTaP, IPV, MMR, and varicella **before** kindergarten entry.

Get sixth-grade ready: Colorado law requires adolescents to receive one dose of Tdap **before** sixth-grade entry, even if the student is 10 years old.

Number of doses and spacing of vaccines:

Colorado follows recommendations set by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's [Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices](#). This committee is a group of medical and public health experts who study vaccines and recommend them for the public. View recommended vaccine schedules for children birth through 6 years of age at <https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/imz-schedules/child-easyread.html> and children/adolescents 7-18 years of age at <https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/imz-schedules/adolescent-easyread.html>.

Vaccines that are not required for school but are recommended include:

COVID-19, hepatitis A (HepA), human papillomavirus (HPV), influenza (flu), and meningococcal disease (MenACWY and MenB). The timing and spacing of these vaccines also follow the recommended vaccine schedules for [children birth through 6 years](#) and [children/adolescents 7-18 years of age](#).

Vaccination records

Share your student's updated Certificate of Immunization with their school every time they receive a vaccine. Need to find your student's vaccine record? Visit COVaxRecords.org for more information.

Exclusion from school

If there is an outbreak of a vaccine-preventable disease at your student's school, and your student has not received the vaccine for that disease, they may be excluded from school for many days. That could mean lost learning time for them and lost work and wages for you. For example, if your student is not up to date with their MMR vaccines, they may need to stay home from school for 21 days after someone gets sick with measles.

Exemptions from one or more school-required vaccines

If your student cannot get vaccines for medical reasons, you must submit a Certificate of Medical Exemption to your school. If you choose not to have your student vaccinated for nonmedical reasons, you must submit a Certificate of Nonmedical Exemption to your school. Nonmedical exemptions must be submitted on an annual basis. Find more information about exemptions at <https://cdphe.colorado.gov/exemptions-to-school-required-vaccines>.

Have questions?

Talk with a health care provider or your local public health agency to ask questions and find out which vaccines your student needs. Find a vaccine provider at cdphe.colorado.gov/get-vaccinated. Read about the benefits and importance of vaccines at cdc.gov/vaccines-children/about/index.html, childvaccineco.org, [ImmunizeForGood.com](https://immunizeforgood.com), and cdphe.colorado.gov/immunization-education.

How is your school doing on vaccinations?

Annually, schools and child cares must report immunization and exemption numbers (but not student names or birthdates) to the state health department. Schools do not control their specific immunization and exemption rates or establish the Vaccinated Children Standard of 95% for all school-required vaccines, described in [§25-4-911, CRS](#).

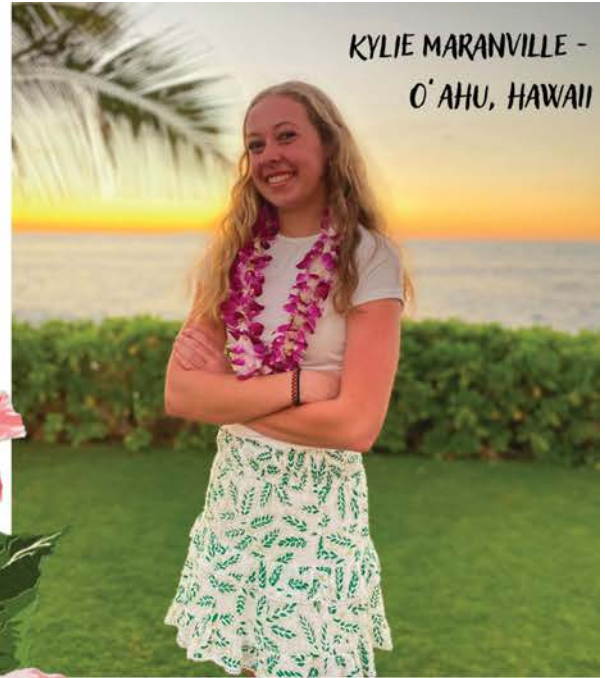

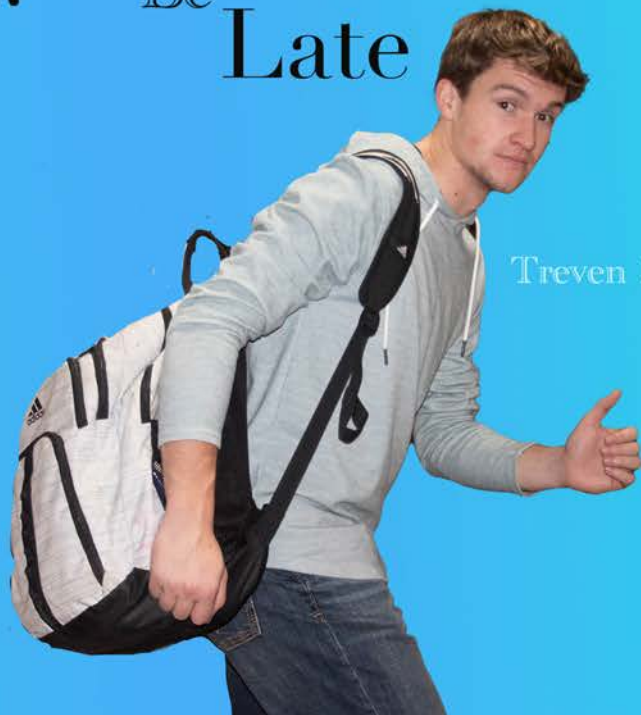
